# Highlights from July & August 2022

The July Club meeting featured the ever-popular "Team Challenge", where attending members

formed into teams of 3 or 4 and created their best bonsai vision from a supplied tree within the very tight time constraints of the meeting. This year, the trees were young cedars. The end results were very creditable and all teams should be congratulated on their efforts. The finished trees were purchased by lucky team members and taken home to add to their collections.

The August Club meeting featured a presentation and demonstration by the very talented bonsai practitioner Peter Fewster, on the subject of creating a root-over-rock bonsai. Peter shared with

us his experience and knowledge gained from many years of experimentation in this area.

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Peter prefers to use trident maples for root over rock compositions as they are tough and the roots grip the rock well and spread with age. The best rocks incorporate nooks, crannies and fissures for maximum interest — they can be found anywhere but Peter has had much success around

Westernport, Corinella and Stony Point. Interesting rocks can also be purchased from aquarium supply shops.

Young seedlings should be placed on the rock so that the tree growth follows the rock characteristics. Roots are divided into at least three bundles to go over both sides of the rock. Peter's methodology is to tie the roots to the rock with aluminium wire and then let the roots grow over and absorb the wire. It is important to get the roots in as close a contact with the rock as possible. Place the rock and tree combination into a pot and cover with soil — Peter doesn't use aluminium foil to cover the roots on the rock.

Fertilise the tree extensively — we are after rapid bulk growth. Placing the pot directly on the ground will further promote growth as the roots extend from the holes in the pot and into the ground.

Check the tree the following dormant season by removing it from the pot. Re-wire and pack the roots if necessary to ensure tight contact with the rock. Thread-graft new roots if there are any unsightly gaps in the root structure. Re-bury the rock with a higher position in the pot to start exposing the roots. Repeat until the desired result is achieved.

## Highlights from July & August - Cont. From Page 1

Peter's demo tree did not require root grafts, but needed branches in some bare areas on the trunk, so he demonstrated thread grafting techniques for the benefit of attending members.

Peter said that rocks can get very hot in summer, and that the Japanese growers often drape moistened cloth over the roots and rock in the height of summer to protect the tree.

Peter also shared his experience in developing thick trunked tridents quickly. Grow in the ground and let the tree grow unchecked — each 1m of height produces roughly 1cm of trunk girth. Do a severe trunk chop, then continue to grow in the ground. Repeat every year or two, and feed well to maximise growth.

During the refinement and maintenance phase of tree development, fertilizing is reduced with an aim to achieve more compact growth patterns.

Peter also shared a method he has seen described of fusing seedlings together to form a shaped thicker trunked tree. Used wire is gathered together, twisted, and then shaped into a pleasing curved form, A bunch of seedlings are spread out around the base of the wire structure and then tied to the wire bundle. The seedlings will fuse together over time and assume the formed shape of the wire.

Peter uses tea bags to hold solid fertiliser pellets such as Dynamic Lifter. The filled bags are placed on the soil — water passing through the bags leaches goodness from the pellets but all of the fine remnant particles are retained in the bag. Each bag will last for about 1 month before depletion of most of the active ingredients. A useful tip is to drop the used tea bags into a bucket of water for a few days. This has the effect of leaching out the last bit of goodness from the fertilizer. The resultant water can be used as a liquid fertilizer.



## From the NBPCA—by Leigh Taafe

In preparation for our move from temporary residence in Commonwealth Park, up to our existing facility within the National Arboretum in Canberra, we increased our holding of bonsai and penjing from around 30 trees up to a number over 100. In order to do this, we relied heavily on the bonsai community to increase their loans and donations so that we had a selection of trees to choose from to create a worthy display for our grand opening in February 2013.

The bonsai community were invaluable in helping us create a brilliant display, with trees coming to us from many parts of Australia. Today I wanted to share with you one of those trees, a Banskia serrata kindly donated by Lynne Farrell from Tasmania. Grown from seed planted in 1980 by the late Neale Farrell, then taken over by Lynne after Neale's death in 1991, this tree has grown from strength to strength over the last 10 years here at the Collection, so much so, that we have had to increase the pot size for the tree twice in that period, and not just a little bit.

One of the interesting points of this tree's journey over the last 10 years here at the Collection is the girth that the tree has put on around the trunk. It is common for Banksia species to "fatten-up", so to speak, when grown in pots. This makes Banksia a brilliant native species for bonsai when what we are aiming to achieve is the illusion of an aged tree, just in miniature. Therefore, making great bonsai in a short space of time. Many people are astounded that this tree only dates back to 1980, as it looks so much older. The diameter of the trunk has increased almost 100% since it arrived at the Collection in late 2012, going from approximately 19.6cm up to an extraordinary 38cm. This increase in girth was at such a rapid rate that the outer bark of the trunk actually split down the side, see pic right. This split happened a few years before the picture, you can see that the next layer of bark is now getting that aged bumpy look as it grows to fill in the space.

The Farrell's are considered two of the early pioneers of bonsai in Australia, Lynne was awarded a Churchill Fellowship to study bonsai in Japan under the Master Sasumu Nakamura. Upon her return, she shared her enthusiasm by teaching bonsai throughout Tasmania. Of interest, Tasmania's first practicing female veterinary surgeon, Lynne was a pioneer of Angora goat genetics and is noted for performing embryo transfer in goats during the 1970's & 80's. In 2006, Lynne was inducted to Tasmania's Honour Roll of Women for her service to Science





# End-Of-Month Saturday Workshop

Regular Club workshops are held on the last Saturday of every month except for December at our normal venue, the Chirnside Park Hub, from 1:00pm to 4:00pm. This year only, we also sacrificed our May workshop due to our Bonsai Show being pushed back by one week due to the Federal election.

# Tree Profile: Juniperus—Juniper

**General**: According to Wikipedia - *Juniperus* are genuses in the cypress family Cupressaceae with about 60 species of juniper widely distributed throughout the world. They are evergreen with needle-like and/or scale-like leaves. They can be either monoecious or dioecious. The most popular variety for Bonsai is the 'Needle' Juniper either Japanese or Chinese. The scale-like leaved one 'Shimpaku' is quite underrated in Australia, but favored in Japan and by myself too (not prickly)!

Many Bonsai Masterpieces are Shimpaku and Masahiko Kimura is known for having many outstanding Shimpaku.

It is one of the best beginner trees in the Bonsai world due to its forgiving nature and the ease of styling them.

**Lighting & Temperature:** Full sun, but in summer partial shade. <u>Frost tolerant to about - 8.0°C!</u> Junipers prefer a humid condition and a humidity tray can help in providing the right level - but <u>don't sit them in to the water to avoid root rot!</u>

**Watering:** Don't allow to dry out and remain dry! Young plants benefit from soaking during dry spells. Good drainage is critical to prevent root rot, <u>don't over water!</u> They benefit from frequent misting to keep the pores dust free - during the growing season spray daily!

**Feeding:** Fortnightly with high nitrogen fertilizer in early spring, don't fertilize in hot summer. Slow release works well with a low level on nitrogen fertilizer in autumn and NO feeding in winter. Rather under than over fertilize ... it could kill them!

**Pruning and Wiring**: Pinching continuously from spring to autumn, but DON'T remove ALL growing tips - it will weaken your tree! If you cut the needles they'll turn brown. Junipers can handle hard pruning as well!

Wiring can be done anytime with care, best in autumn or early winter. Due to the flexibility of the trunk and branches whilst young heavy bends can be made easily. Older trees need to be protected with raffia or tape - watch out for the at times brittle deadwood! Depending on the age of the tree the wire can remain on from 3 months to a year, watch the wire over the summer month. "Clip and grow" achieves excellent results as well.

**Repotting**: Early spring is best when new buds appear. Avoid too much root disturbance, but remove any rotting or sick roots. For a better recovery don't remove more than about 25%. Add some washed course river sand to your bonsai mix for good drainage. Young trees every two years, older ones only every three to five years.

Propagation: Hardwood cuttings and air layer in spring, softwood or from seeds in autumn.

**Pests and diseases:** Scales, spider mites, webworms, aphids and needle miners - use specific pesticides. Rust fungus and root rot if poor drainage.

**Styles:** Every style and form of bonsai is possible! Great with Driftwood, Jin, Shari, Phoenix graft and for Landscapes too!

## Just to name a few species suitable for Bonsai:

Juniperus chinensis - Chinese Juniper, showing juvenile needle-like leaves, adult scale-leaves

Juniperus procumbens – Ibuki Juniper, very common as Bonsai with needle-like green leaves

**Juniperus squamata - Flaky Juniper**, valued for its needle-like bluish foliage and compact habit.

Juniperus chinensis 'Shimpaku' - Shimpaku Juniper, its attractive scale-like leaved and beautiful bark make this one of the top candidates for bonsai.

**Juniperus communis - Common Juniper,** it has needle-like leaves in whorls of three; the leaves are green, with a single white stomatal band on the inner surface.

**Juniperus rigida - Temple or Needle Juniper**, open habit with graceful drooping branches with green needle-like and scale-like leaves. It is much loved as Bonsai with many fine and old examples.

## Bonsai Calendar: September - October

Following are the main tasks to focus on during this time of year.

#### Repotting/Root pruning

- When repotting, look for ways to improve the overall appearance of your bonsai. For example, changing the position of the tree by turning, lifting or leaning the tree. Also consider alternative pot choices.
- Watch for the buds to swell on deciduous trees. Repot before buds break into leaf.
- Begin your repotting with deciduous varieties such as, maples, oaks, elms (September) and then continue with varieties such as, cryptomerias, azaleas, pyracanthas and pines (October).
- After repotting, keep your trees in a protected area away from extreme weather (hot or cold)

#### Wiring

- Wire all trees before repotting, rather than after repotting. This will minimize any movement to the tree after being repotted.
- Deciduous trees should be wired before breaking into leaf. Be careful not to damage the delicate buds while wiring branches
- Watch carefully for wire damage at this time of year as most trees are growing at a rapid rate.

#### Pinching/Pruning

- Begin to pinch back new shoots as soon as they appear.
- Frequent pruning/pinching will improve ramification and help reduce leaf size throughout the growing season.
- Remove dying flowers from the tree as it weakens the plant and encourages pests.

#### Fertilizing/Watering

- With new growth, the need of water and fertilizer increases. Try to observe your trees individually to establish the amount and frequency of watering necessary.
- Avoid overwatering. Remember it is a process of wetting and drying.
- Use a slow release fertilizer (Osmocote/Dynamic Lifter) in combination with a liquid fertilizer (Powerfeed, Charlie Carp).
- It is better to fertilize regularly and frequently in small weak doses than give a strong dose now and then.
- With flowering species, fertilizing should commence after flowering.
- Water your trees (with plain water) before using liquid fertilizer.
