Highlights from July & August 2023

The July club meeting featured a demonstration on "Working on Root Balls" by club sponsor and proprietor of Bonsai Sensation nursery Tien Hsu Liao.

Tien is a favourite presenter as he always provides useful information with a practical approach based on his long experience as a commercial bonsai nurseryman.

Tien stated that there are two basic reasons for working on root balls:

If the tree is pot bound, .



meaning that water doesn't flow easily through the soil and consequently air can't be drawn in

To train the nebari and produce the flare that enhances the appearance of a bonsai. .

Tien concentrated on deciduous trees, and stated that he considers a maximum time of 2 years between repots when using his own mix to be optimum. This can be extended to 3-4 years for more durable mixes and for older trees.

The best time to repot deciduous trees is late winter to early spring, when the buds swell-let the tree tell you when it is time. Repotting too late means that there may be insufficient water transfer up to the developing leaves, and too early leaves wounded roots lying in wet soil for too long, risking root rot. Deciduous trees may be bare-rooted and hosed clean if required, but never evergreens.

Root pruning rejuvenates the root system so that there are always new young roots present. The tree is more vigorous and responds better to top work after repotting.

All roots should be radially-spread and originate from the same level. This produces a swelling at that point and a consequent spreading of the nebari-the flare that we are seeking. Hollow out directly under the trunk to form a callous, preventing downwards roots from forming and encouraging the radial spread of the surface roots. Remove or shorten all thick roots.

Tien's advice is to not be too "kind" to deciduous trees-they will thank you for it by the way they respond.

If an emergency situation arises where the tree appears potbound and it is out of season, consider drilling holes in the root-

ball to let additional moisture in, and/or make a retaining wall of sphagnum moss to hold water on the pot linger, and/or soak the pot in a water bath.

The August club meeting featured another favourite guest presenter, Craig Wilson from Gentiana Nursery, who demonstrated "Group or Forest Plantings".

In Craig's opinion the best group plantings are made from deciduous trees, although any trees can be used. Some examples of trees that create great forest plantings would be Japanese / Trident Maples, Beech and Zelkova, or Cryptomeria, Hinoki or even pines. It is also best to use a single species as mixed species group plantings do not always work. It can be done but you need to be very skilled to get away with it.

Deciduous trees can be jammed close together. In group plantings, it's less about the taper of the trunks and more about the continuity of flow, trunk thickness-

es and heights. Deciduous trees are always best displayed with their branches angling upwards slightly and only turning down or horizontal at the tips

When choosing trees for a group planting, select trees that have a similar form and movement. The main tree will always set the tone of the group. Once the main tree has been selected, you need to find a secondary tree that will generally be positioned hard up against the main tree. From there you can begin to select trees to fill in around the group and build up the layering of trees. It is good to have a number of trees available to choose from.

Before starting to work on any of the trees, ready the pot with a number of tie down wires – and be generous with your wire (use 2 or 3mm wire so that it won't snap on tightening). It's better to start with too much wire and cut off any excess.

Bear in mind that with group plantings every tree needs to be 'the same but different'. Your trunks need to be a similar shape and direction, with consistency of foliage being very important. Trees should have different spacings between them to create a forest or woodland feel rather than a plantation! Straight trunks should not be made to lean out away from the group – only use curved trunked material to lean away from the group. Prepare the trees by removing all the old planting mix, so the mix in the new planting is of a consistent grade. Some old mix may hold more water than the new mix resulting in constantly wet areas around the roots. Rake all the roots and prune any that might need it. At home, Craig would prefer to hose the roots of all mix to make sure everything was removed.

To begin the group, Craig positioned the main tree and secondary tree on the table, tweaking the secondary tree to fit next to the main tree. He then began to fill in around the first pair with more trees, visually checking the fit, checking for branch congestion and that there were no branches crossing into one another; as well as siting the trees to look natural together. If necessary, branches were pruned to allow a good fit. He stressed that the root system was fundamental. Roots and branches will follow each other - a tangled root system will produce tangled branches.

Craig, assisted by Steve, spent quite a bit of time preparing the roots on all the trees, trimming the roots to fit snugly into a clump and rearranging the trees until they were happy with the look and feel of the group. The idea is that once the trees are bunched together snugly they will meld together.

Craig stressed that the main tree needs to be head and shoulders above the rest. He also recommended using an appropriate cut paste or putty immediately, and explained that the putty is for soft barked species such as azaleas and maples and the paste for hard barked species such as pines. Using the wrong one can inhibit healing and cause a lump

Tree Profile: Dwarf Pomegranate - Punica Granatum

General Information: Originally cultivated since prehistoric times in the ancient Mediterranean and Asia, the 'Dwarf Pomegranate' is a popular choice for Bonsai. It has opposite leaves and grows oval shaped flowers, turning in to yellow/red fruits.

Lighting &Temperature: Full sun and good air circulation for best results. Protect from hard frost below -5°C.

Watering: Keep the tree damp, don't let it dry out and give plenty of water when fruiting. By keeping the pomegranate slightly dry in mid to late spring, the tree is encouraged to set flowering shoots.

Feeding: If you want the tree to grow healthy flowers and fruits, use a fertilizer with high phosphorous and high potassium from spring to late summer. Remove flowers if you opt for fast growth. Don't feed in winter!

Pruning and wiring: If you want the tree to flower wait with any pruning until after blooming, then prune back to one or two sets of leaves. Alternatively the plant could be pruned hard before any new shoots emerge in spring, to make way for the new growth. Flowering shoots are usually shorter than leaf shoots and are carried at the terminals.

Wiring can be done from spring through the end of autumn.

Propagation: From seeds, sowing in spring or by using cuttings in summer. From root cuttings, many also sucker up from the roots; the suckers may be separated from the roots in autumn or in the following spring.

Collecting in spring or autumn with the maximum amount of root ball retained when planting the tree in a pot or box to recover. Do use the method of submerging the potted tree into water after collection for 2 to 3 weeks. The abundance of water enables new roots to easily take in water and stops the leaves from becoming limp and falling.

Repotting: Repot the tree every two years in spring when the buds are forming. Young trees are repotted every year. Never use shallow containers when re- potting because it flowers well when slightly root bound. It needs soil capacity and a reservoir effect to support it in this condition.

Pots in blues, yellows, unglazed browns and grays are very suitable.

Pests and Diseases: Usually they're trouble free, but can sometimes be affected by aphids. Treat with pyrethrum or a similar insecticide.

Styles: Informal upright, forest, cascade, literati, in/on the rock, root over rock, twin trunk, windswept, group and twisting trunk style, also suitable for deadwood features

Bonsai Calendar: September - October

Following are the main tasks to focus on during this time of year.

Repotting/Root pruning

When repotting, look for ways to improve the overall appearance of your bonsai. For example, changing the position of the tree by turning, lifting or leaning the tree. Also consider alternative pot choices.

Watch for the buds to swell on deciduous trees. Repot before buds break into leaf.

Begin your repotting with deciduous varieties such as, maples, oaks, elms (September) and then continue with varieties such as, cryptomerias, azaleas, pyracanthas and pines (October).

After repotting, keep your trees in a protected area away from extreme weather (hot or cold)

Wiring

Wire all trees before repotting, rather than after repotting. This will minimize any movement to the tree after being repotted.

Deciduous trees should be wired before breaking into leaf. Be careful not to damage the delicate buds while wiring branches. Watch carefully for wire damage at this time of year as most trees are growing at a rapid rate.

Pinching/Pruning

Begin to pinch back new shoots as soon as they appear.

Frequent pruning/pinching will improve ramification and help reduce leaf size throughout the growing season.

Remove dying flowers from the tree as it weakens the plant and encourages pests.

Fertilizing/Watering

With new growth, the need of water and fertilizer increases. Try to observe your trees individually to establish the amount and frequency of watering necessary.

Avoid overwatering. Remember it is a process of wetting and drying.

Use a slow release fertilizer (Osmocote/Dynamic Lifter) in combination with a liquid fertilizer (Powerfeed, Charlie Carp).

It is better to fertilize regularly and frequently in small weak doses than give a strong dose now and then.

With flowering species, fertilizing should commence after flowering.

Water your trees (with plain water) before using liquid fertilizer.

Last month our 35th National Bonsai Convention, with the theme Back Together, was held at the Crown Resort in Perth, WA. It was a wonderful event with a fabulous line up of top-class demonstrators from Japan and Spain and well supported by local Australian talent.

There was a fine exhibition of over 120 bonsai including many unique WA native species. It was the largest exhibition at a convention for many years and included a group planting of Melaleucas that Tony Bebb created for his demonstration at the 9th World Bonsai Convention in October 2022. Only 12 months on and it was definitely a prize winner. Many large local WA stones were included in the fine display of Suiseki.

With so much work put in over several years the low attendance figures were disappointing.
