

Highlights from May & June 2024

The May club meeting featured special guest presenter and Club sponsor Tien Hsu Liao from Bonsai Sensation Nursery who spoke on "Deciduous Pruning and Styling". A favourite guest who is always entertaining and informative, Tien gave his take on deciduous tree development based on his extensive experience at his nursery. He used various members' trees that were brought in, as examples.

Tien introduced his "Principles of Pruning" to guide pruning activities, specifically for deciduous trees but also generally applicable to other species.

TIEN'S PRINCIPLES OF PRUNING

Tien emphasized that it takes time to build a bonsai. He normally

prunes deciduous trees around May or June, soon after leaf drop. It is also preferable to prune more often, rather than once

Tien demonstrated his approach on members' trees—a young trident maple, an older crab apple, a Chinese elm, and a trident

The June meeting featured a presentation by our own President Patrick I, who spoke on "Styling Dynamics". He prefaced his

discussion by saying that he was not presenting his original thoughts, but what he was learning from various sources along

his bonsai journey. He did not want to change any of the basic approaches to design, but rather to bring some extra aspects to the fore—what <u>feeling</u> is the design.

The purpose of designing our trees is generally:

- Beautiful
- Recreation of nature in miniature
- Depict great age
- Generate something interesting
- To elicit an emotion from the viewer.

Nature forms patterns—trees are symmetrical in youth, mostly pyramidal, but as life goes on random processes create change—asymmetry results. Asymmetry in our design allows us to tell the particular story of a tree.

The crux of everything is the relationship of the three styling feelings harmonious, tension, dynamic—to the perpendicular centre line of the tree.

Harmonious—the trunk line, main defining branch and apex all move in agreement away from the perpendicular centre line.

Tension—trunk line is in contradiction with the main defining branch and apex.

Dynamic-trunk line and defining branch move in contradiction to the apex.

Harmonious design is simple and elegant, and accepts what we are given by the tree. We use it in a tree that has enough—we just bring out what is already there. It has enough interest, age, features and qualities.

Tension as a design feel can often be used with less expensive material, that which has less initial character evident or less potential. In Tension, we bring interest to the tree. We use the defining branch and apex moving against the movement of the trunk to make conflict of these elements, to be the component that gives the tree its interest. Tension can also be used when a base can't support a harmonious design either visually or physically.

In Dynamic design, there are two aspects-artistic and technical.

With the artistic aspect, we have material with a high degree of rotation and twisting, live wood and dead wood, something that falls outside of the norm of most bonsai material. We can artistically raise its level even higher than it presents.

With the technical aspect, we may have a form like semi-cascade or cascade which may not have the features in the trunk to carry the weight of all the elements that are moving away from the base, which might be narrow. If this is the case, we can pull the apex away from the direction of the defining branch to bring the visual mass back to the trunkline and bring visual balance to the line.

Patrick made extensive use of photos of actual trees projected onto the whiteboard, and then drew lines on the board over the photos to illustrate his points about styling elements. He also illustrated his points by innovative body positions!

AABC Bonsai Convention

The 2024 AABC National Bonsai Convention was held in Brisbane in May under the auspices of the Bonsai Society of Queensland and attracted a total of 182 visitors from various Australian states and New Zealand. It pro-



vided attending delegates with a great learning opportunity, and showcased a high quality exhibition of bonsai and suiseki.

The 2025 National Convention was announced to be held in Canberra from 16th to 19th May 2025, hosted by the Canberra Bonsai Society. Featured international artists will be from USA - Jennifer Price from Chicago and Michael Hagedorn from Portland. In addition, three Australian artists will be on the program as demonstrators—Jarryd Bailey from Tasmania, Sam Thompson from the NBPCA in Canberra, and Marcela Ferreira from Melbourne. The venue will be the Canberra Rex Hotel and the National Arboretum.

Members are encouraged to consider attending the Convention to improve their bonsai knowledge, and as a side benefit to view the National Bonsai and Penjing Collection at the Arboretum.

Hirotoshi Saito Demonstration



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Tree Profile: Hawthorn - Crataegus

General information: Crataegus also commonly called Hawthorn or Whitethorn, is comprised of about 200 species. A native to temperate regions of the Northern Hemisphere in Europe, Asia and North America. Some species producing good autumn colour turning yellow, red or orange. Hawthorn is very suitable for Bonsai due to its quick and fine branch ramification. The other attractions are the clusters of white or double pink flowers in mid-spring and small red berries in autumn. They take about 15 to 20 years to flower! The branches on most species contain strong spikes.

Position: Full sun, but semi-shade in summer, protect from hot northerly winds and strong frost.

Watering: Most hawthorns like a lot of water, especially in summer! Keep moist all the time - don't let them dry out!

Feeding: Once a month from spring to autumn. High phosphorus and potassium fertiliser to promote flowering. In late summer use low nitrogen to harden the growth. Don't fertilize in midsummer!

Repotting: Young plants every year, older ones every second or third year in spring before leaf buds open or autumn when plant is dormant. Use standard bonsai mix not too free draining to keep the moisture up!

Pruning and Wiring: Cut back new shots to two leaves with constant clipping to keep the shape under control. Structural and heavy pruning before leaves appear. Large wounds can take a long time to heal over! Wiring can be done during spring and summer, but best in autumn. Keep checking regularly for scarring!

Styles: Formal upright, Informal Upright, Slanting, Cascade, Semi-cascade, Root-overrock, Twin-trunk, Clump, Group planting and Saikei. Any size!

Propagation: Softwood cuttings in summer, air-layering in spring, root development can take a long time. From seed when fruit is ripe!

Pests and diseases: Aphids, Caterpillars, Powdery Mildew and Rust.

Species most common for Bonsai:

Common Hawthorn/ Crataegus monogyna varieties, also known as Quick or Quickthorn. It is a rounded, deciduous tree with fragrant white flowers.

Hawthorn/ Crataegus oxycantha (syn.Crataegus laevigata), also known as May or Midland Hawthorn, the Crataegus oxycantha variety 'Pauls Scarlet' with its profuse, double, dark-pink flowers.

Bonsai Calendar: July - August

Most species that are used for bonsai are hardy (able to withstand freezing) however, when grown in containers they do not have the ability to bury their roots deep into the ground, which insulates them from the cold. The Melbourne climate rarely reaches zero (freezing) or sub zero temperatures but protecting your trees from the winter elements may still be necessary. Be wary of extremely wet weather as having your trees saturated for extended amounts of time may lead to problems through rotting of the roots, which is invariably fatal!

Having the ability to inspect the detailed branch structure of your deciduous trees in winter provides an excellent opportunity to consider restyling your trees. Here are a few tips to get you through the winter.

- Monitor the weather and protect your bonsais from excess rain, wind and cold. Find the most protected area in your yard. Place them undercover if necessary.
- Remove any dead leaves from around your trees and display benches, as these can become a breeding ground for insect pests.
- Prune and thin out your conifers where necessary to set up their growth for the coming growing season.
- Keep your trees as well drained as possible. Place bricks or blocks of wood under your bonsais to ensure water is escaping the pot and air is circulating around and under your trees.
- Carefully inspect each tree and make any changes that will improve your bonsai. Remember the busy potting season is not far away so having your wiring and pruning complete before this time will take the pressure off.
- Avoid the temptation to repot too early. Wait until the buds start to swell before attempting this procedure.
- Prepare your potting medium and place in a dry area. Organize any other items needed for potting (root picks, mesh, scoops etc.)
- Consider what pot you will use for each of your trees. Place them next to the bonsais that they will be paired with.
- It is not necessary to fertilise your trees when they are in dormancy, however evergreens are still growing slowly and natives may not even slow down too much, depending on species and weather conditions. An occasional application of liquid fertilizer can benefit these trees.

It is difficult to predict the changing of the seasons. Trying to schedule with the use of a calendar may lead to problems. Watch your trees carefully and let them guide you.
