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

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Highlights from July & August 2024

The July meeting feature special guest presenter and AABC Visiting Tutor David Nassar who gave a very entertaining and informative presentation and demonstration on cultivating and styling shimpaku junipers.

David explained that he started his bonsai journey many years ago, and like most of us added almost every species into his collection. He eventually elected to reduce his varieties and specialize in shimpaku junipers, maples and pines.

David likes shimpaku junipers because they are not prone to branch die back like other junipers, they do not suffer from a lot of pests, and if they do get an infestation it is generally easy to treat, they have dense, compact foliage, and they are not prickly. He gets most of his shimpaku bonsai starters from air layering off growing stock trees, after first bending and twisting the selected branches before applying the layer. He air layers using sphagnum moss media only,

and favours wrapping in clear plastic followed by black plastic. Unwrapping the black plastic allows inspection through the clear plastic to check for root growth. Cuttings can also be used and strike very easily, but the trees take a little longer to develop.

Young trees should be wired with many twists and turns. David favours tight wiring at a shallow angle, around 30 degrees, and says that no raffia is needed utilizing this method. All bending and twisting work should be carried out from the end of summer through to the start of spring, when the trees are semi-dormant, otherwise there is a greater risk of snapping the trunk or branches.

Shimpaku like lots of sun, water, fertilizer, and good air circulation. They should not be pinched, but cut the shoots once per year, with winter being the best time to do it. Let the shoots grow over spring and summer. David uses Powerfeed pellets as a fertilizer, and applies it over winter as junipers and pines are still growing then.

David recommends repotting deciduous trees in July, junipers in August, and pines in August/September. With junipers, he does the top work first and then repots a year or two later.

After his demonstration, David critiqued various members' junipers which had been brought in, and provided much valuable advice for their future development.

The August meeting featured a presentation by Victor B on Accent plants and features used in Bonsai display settings. He used his trips to the Kokufu and Taiken-ten bonsai exhibitions in Japan with Tony Bebb as the basis for illustrating his discussion, using a slide presentation with many pictures. He introduced the concept of tokonama 3 point displays for bonsai, and explained that the accents used in conjunction with the bonsai can be plants, statues/ figures, or stones/suiseki.

It is most important that the size of the accent is in proportion to the size of the main tree. E.g. small tree, small ac-

cent piece.

Victor also introduced the concept of kusumono, which is a combination planting of grasses, weeds, and even succulents in a separate pots. This art form developed alongside bonsai, and can also be used as a accent.

Victor suggested that Craig Wilson's Gentiana Nursery in Olinda can be a useful source of small specialized plants to be used as accents.

Bonsai Training Courses

The course covers a wide range including origins, styles, species, growing and development, refinement, wiring, repotting and maintenance. A new course manual which better reflects the current content will be provided to all students for reference during the course and for future review, along with a tree on which to work.

The next scheduled course will be in 2025, however if there is sufficient demand this may be brought forward to later in the 2024 year. Any interested members should put their names down on the list present at each meeting, or contact Lindsay H linha-d14@gmail.com.

Tony Bebb October Visit


We had Tony Bebb down for a demonstration and tutored workshops last year, and his visit was so rewarding to participating members that we are repeating it this year in October. Tony is a well-known and highly respected Australian bonsai professional and AABC Visiting Tutor, based in Brisbane. He will be conducting a special wiring tutorial and workshop at the meeting on Tuesday 8th October. Bring along your own trees that need wiring, or utilize one of the clubprovided trees on which to practice your wiring techniques. You will have the opportunity to purchase the tree at the end of the night (a black pine), or can simply leave it with the club.

Tony will also be conducting Tutored Workshops on Sunday 6th October, morning session from 9am to 12 noon, and afternoon session from 1pm to 4pm, to be held at Japara House in Kilsyth due to a competing booking at the Chirnside Park Hub. The cost is \$50 per session, very reasonable to gain the attention and assistance of such a talented and experienced bonsai professional.

Bookings are essential as slots are limited to 8 persons at both sessions. Only 5 vacancies remain at this time. Contact Lindsay H (linhad14@gmail.com or 0403 800 671) if you would like to book a slot.



Tony will also be available for personal one-on-one sessions at your own premises. Half-day sessions are available on Monday 7th October and Tuesday 8th October—4 slots only, and one has already been booked. Again, contact Lindsay H for bookings. During Tony's visit to your premises, you can request his advice or assistance with any or all trees in your collection—you call the shots and nominate what you want. Cost will be \$200 per session.





2024 YVBS Bonsai Show

Our Bonsai Show will this year be held in November—a spring show at which we will hopefully be able to exhibit some trees in flower as an added attraction.

The Show will be held on Saturday 23rd November and Sunday 24th November at the Chirnside Park Community Hub.

Each member is encouraged to submit at least one tree for display, however multiple trees can be offered if preferred. A Tree Submission Form will be distributed to all members in September and again in October, and we request that this form be filled in with your tree/s information and returned as soon as possible. This is required to enable Steve M to make a final tree selection and to design the display layout.

Select your trees now and start to prepare them for display at the Show. Remember the following guidelines:

- Foliage should be neatly trimmed, free of pests, and with all dead or discoloured leaves/needles removed.
- Soil surface should be neat and weed-free. Top dressing or moss should be applied if preferred.
- Pots should be thoroughly cleaned and the bottoms should be free of dirt and debris.
- Wire on the tree is permissible if required, but should be minimal and neat if present.
- Trees should be watered the day before delivery to the Show, but should not be dropping when delivered.
- Pots and stands should be labelled with the owner's name on the underneath surface. Pen on masking tape is a good means of labelling.

Lets make this our best Show ever!

Spring Launch at Bunnings

The Club has been invited to participate in the Spring Launch event at Bunnings Lilydale on Saturday 12th October from 10am to 2pm, which we have accepted. We hope to have a couple of tables where we will display 6—8 trees, and maybe have a running demonstration. Of course, we will have club information and membership forms available as well!

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Tree Profile: Swamp Cypress—Taxodium distichum

General information: The Swamp Cypress or Bald Cypress (Taxodium distichum) is native to the south eastern United States. It is a deciduous conifer which is hardy and tough, adapting to a wide range of soil types, whether wet, salty, dry, or swampy. It is noted for the russet-re autumn colour of its lacy leaves/needles. The heartwood and roots are rot-resistant.

Position: Full sun.

Watering: It is vital for the health of the tree that its roots stay moist constantly. Use a soil mix that retains water.

Feeding: Use your normal bonsai feeding regime during the growing period.

Repotting: During dormancy in winter. A soil mix of at least 80% organic matter and 20% inorganic material is recommended, although they will happily exist in any mix provided that it does not dry out. Slightly acidic soil is preferred – pH range of 5.5 to 6.8.


Pruning & Wiring: Bud pinching – pinching new growth reduces leaf size and promotes back budding. Elongating shoots can also have a few cm trimmed off if they are getting too long or thick. The pinched leaves will fill in the space where the tip was removed, but they will not continue to elongate.

Pruning – Prune only when vascular tissue has been established, otherwise the shoot will die back over winter. It is safe to prune after a new shoot has changed colour from green through pale pink to reddish rust colour. Once this colour is reached, it is safe to prune. On most trees, prune back once per growing season, around the start of December. The only other time to prune is during dormancy in winter.

Wire during winter.

Styles: Formal Upright, Informal Upright, Slanting, Group/Forest

Propagation: From seed, but cuttings also strike well.



Pests and diseases: Not prone to any particular pest or disease, but be vigilant and treat any infestations noted. Possums like the new foliage!


Knees: Swamp Cypress are known for having knees, which are woody projections from the root system that project above the ground or swamp water. The purpose is to provide oxygen to the roots. To develop knees on bonsai swamp cypress, the tree must be over 12 years old and the water table must be at the right depth in relation to the roots. To grow knees, place the pot in a water reservoir filled with water up to, but not above, the rim of the pot. The water level is maintained daily during the wet season (summer). Once the dry season arrives, remove the pot from the water reservoir. Knees can take 2-3 years to develop, though they can develop in one year. Note that this procedure must be followed every year after knees have developed, or the knees may be lost.

On The Display Table



Bonsai Calendar: September - October

Following are the main tasks to focus on during this time of year.

Repotting/Root pruning

When repotting, look for ways to improve the overall appearance of your bonsai. For example, changing the position of the tree by turning, lifting or leaning the tree. Also consider alternative pot choices.

Watch for the buds to swell on deciduous trees. Repot before buds break into leaf.

Begin your repotting with deciduous varieties such as, maples, oaks, elms (September) and then continue with varieties such as, cryptomerias, azaleas, pyracanthas and pines (October).

After repotting, keep your trees in a protected area away from extreme weather (hot or cold)

Wiring

Wire all trees before reporting, rather than after reporting. This will minimize any movement to the tree after being reported. Deciduous trees should be wired before breaking into leaf. Be careful not to damage the delicate buds while wiring branches. Watch carefully for wire damage at this time of year as most trees are growing at a rapid rate.

Pinching/Pruning

Begin to pinch back new shoots as soon as they appear.

Frequent pruning/pinching will improve ramification and help reduce leaf size throughout the growing season.

Remove dying flowers from the tree as it weakens the plant and encourages pests.

Fertilizing/Watering

With new growth, the need of water and fertilizer increases. Try to observe your trees individually to establish the amount and frequency of watering necessary.

Avoid overwatering. Remember it is a process of wetting and drying.

Use a slow release fertilizer (Osmocote/Dynamic Lifter) in combination with a liquid fertilizer (Powerfeed, Charlie Carp).

It is better to fertilize regularly and frequently in small weak doses than give a strong dose now and then.

With flowering species, fertilizing should commence after flowering.

Water your trees (with plain water) before using liquid fertilizer.

YVBS Tree Profiles

Each issue of the newsletter since the Club was formed has contained a Tree Profile containing information on growing and styling various tree species with particular attention to conditions found in the local area based on actual members' experience.

For ease of access going forward, all of the Tree Profiles have been extracted from the newsletters and loaded to the Club website, where they can be individually downloaded in PDF format for display or printing.

To access the Profiles, go to the website

www.yarravalleybonsai.org.au and hit "Tree Profiles" on the top menu bar (under the ••• tab). A new page will load containing a complete listing of available tree profiles in alphabetical order based on botanical names. Where appropriate, the common name is included after the botanical name.

Of course, the Tree Profiles can still be found in the old newsletters, but following the redesign of the web site, not all of the past newsletters are available for download. Only the past 2 years of newsletters have been included on the new website.
