Highlights from November & December 2024

The November Club meeting kicked off with a presentation from Patrick I on "Trees for a Warming Climate", looking forward to the apparent reality that we are entering a period of warming climate and considering what this means to us locally. The outlook is not all bad—we can look forward to less frosts and warmer, shorter winters, but perhaps longer and hotter heat waves in summer. There will be some benefits for us—increased CO2 will lead to more plant growth. Longer growing seasons might mean more opportunity for ramification - e.g. - Tony Bebb was telling us that he (and everyone else in Brisbane) gets 3 flushes

of growth on their Japanese Black Pines. Maybe we will experience the same.

Further - those heat tender plants that you love now - will probably still be viable - whatever you do to nurture them through the heat spells that we have you will just need to do for longer - perhaps with a little bit more technical support - like misting systems to lower temperature.

There are many trees that we currently grow, know and love that will be perfectly fine in a warmer climate.

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Coniferous Trees: Pines, cedars, junipers (especially USA varieties), some spruce.

Deciduous Trees: many oaks, bougainvillea, elms, hawthorn, pomegranate.

Broadleaf Evergreens: Olives, cotoneasters, pyracantha, metrosideros.

Other exotic species that may be considered for the future appear by considering other warmer regions of the world—
Mediterranean, California, Madagascar, etc. Such plants as Manzanitas, Conocarpus, Phyllyrea, Uncaria, Pachypodium, Adansonia, Operculicarya may be appropriate, if available.

And some Australian natives from the dry tropics or rainforests, or even from the dryer parts of Victoria—Atalya salicifolia, Bologhia inopylla, Dysoxylum fraserianum, Flindersia maculosa, Erythrina vespertillio, Pittosporum angustifolium.

Following Patrick's presentation, Nick R talked a little about propagation techniques particularly from seed and by cuttings. He emphasized that growing from seed leads to natural genetic variation, while cuttings produce an effective clone of the parent plant. Use a soil medium with a

fine particle mix for both seed and cuttings, a perlite, peat and sand mixture is good. Cuttings in particular need moisture, but not too much.

A mini-greenhouse as available from Bunnings is useful to maintain the appropriate humidity and temperatures. For cuttings, first and second year growth is best. Make a half centimeter wound at the base and dip in hormone rooting powder prior to planting in the soil mix.

The December meeting was our Christmas breakup, which started off with a few members talking about one of their trees.

First up was Ken, who bought a Ficus rubignosa (Port Jackson Fig) that he had acquired after the death of our late Treasurer, Richard J. The tree is therefore very special to Ken and he managed to commission a pot from a renowned ceramicist (who does not normally do bonsai pots) – Ted Secomb.

Patrick reminded us that most, if not all of our trees, prefer a position in full sun, but it's worth transitioning them gradually if they have been in shade.

Next, Steve showed us two of David's lovely pots that he had repaired after breakage. Steve had managed to make a feature out of missing pieces by growing the cascading tree out of the gap. Very impressive "kintsugi" but don't drop your pots!

Grant then talked about his literati Cedrus brevifolia (Cyprian Cedar)
that he is developing from nursery stock. It was an impressive tree for something that has only been a bonsai for a short while although Grant is hoping to create the impression of more movement using shari on the long, rather straight trunk.

David showed off his beautiful Bougainvillea that he had brought down from Queensland with a substantial root base and bright pink/purple flowers. It has had three flushes of blooms this year!

Then we had Jason to talk about his coveted Larix decidua (European Larch), a tree which has a reputation as being difficult to manage in a hot, dry climate. Jason has the advantage of being in a slightly cooler, wetter climate in the hills but recommends a

slightly deeper pot than normal to make sure the roots are not exposed, and full sun (maybe a little afternoon shade and watch the wind). Larch have fine roots and need at least two months winter dormancy. They thicken quickly and can have up to three flushes of growth each year.

Lyn then got some advice on her Lemon Scented Gum which is in early development and has a lumpy lignotuber bulge just above ground level. The advice was to plant slightly lower in the pot to hide the lump and hope it shoots some more roots, give the tree plenty of fertiliser and let it grow some more.

Finally, Patrick showed us the progression of a large Pinus contorta that he had styled with Tony Bebb back in October. Patrick showed some photos and video of the design process (1) clean and thin the growth to allow light in (2) work out what branches can come off (using a black cloth to hide them so you can consider before cutting) and (3) changing the planting angle. Tony had talked about reducing the overall volume of the tree to make the trunk look thicker. Patrick explained how he will completely change the angle in the pot at the next report to turn the tree into a semi cascade. We look forward to updates on this tree as it develops.

At the conclusion of the presentation members enjoyed refreshments and a chat.




Bunnings Display

We have secured the services of noted local bonsai professional Scott Martin from Bonsai Matsu for two events in early 2025.



Bring along a juniper to work on if you have one, otherwise come along and watch Scott and the other members as they work on their trees. Scott clearly evaluates each tree and describes the work required, for the benefit of the owner as well as all observers. Should be a great night!

On Saturday 8th February (the Saturday prior to our normal meeting), Scott will also conduct Tutored Workshops, one in the morning and one in the afternoon, at the Chirnside Park Hub. At these workshops, members should bring along any one or two of their trees that may require Scott's expertise and assistance on improving their design and styling. Take your tree to the next level! Scott is an excellent teacher and communicator, and participants will not be disappointed.

Bookings for the Tutored Workshops are essential, and the cost is \$50 per session. Limited to 8 places at each workshop so all participants can receive due attention.

Bonsai Calendar: January - February

Watering and Position should be the main focus during the summer months. It's a good time of year to be on the safe side when it comes to caring for your trees.

Watering

- Water evenly and thoroughly. This will encourage roots to grow at the bottom of the pot improving the health of the tree.
- Water in the mornings. If this is not possible, water in the evenings but avoid wetting the foliage on species that are susceptible to mildew (Maples, Oaks, Crepe Myrtles). Note that on exceptionally hot days, some of your trees may need watering twice or even three times, to maintain optimum health.
- Bonsai that will require more water: Maples, Camellias, Azaleas, Liquidambars, Elms, Wisterias, Alders, Taxodiums, Beeches, Hornbeams, Pyracanthas, Banksias, Melaleucas, other natives
- Bonsai that will require less water: Pines, Cedars, Corokias,
- It can be a good idea to separate your trees into categories based on their watering needs.

Position

- Morning sun is best. Avoid the afternoon sun in summer. If you have to make a choice and put some trees in the afternoon sun, then most conifers and natives can handle these conditions the best.
- Consider the species and pot size when arranging your display. Take extra care when using small or shallow pots as they will dry out quickly.
- Species such as Beech, Hornbeam, Maples, Spruce will scorch if not protected from both the sun and the wind.
- When looking for shade, avoid placing bonsai directly under garden trees. Pests and diseases can be passed to your bonsai.

Summer is a great time to work on your benches, watering systems, shade cloth and weed around your display. If you are going away for the holidays, put some serious thought into how your trees will be looked after. Many bonsai are lost over this time of year.
