

Community Workshop

The Club was approached to run a paid beginners Bonsai workshop in January by the Kildare Ministries, as part of their leadership seminar being held in the Yarra Valley. Seven participants joined the class run by Lindsay H, Patrick I and Marlene J at the Chirnside Park Hub.

Cedar bonsai starter trees were obtained from Nick R, which were styled by each participant, wired as appropriate, and then potted up into supplied bonsai pots using club soil medium. All of this was achieved within the three hour time allotment. A brief Introduction to Bonsai talk preceded the practical work.

The participants were all extremely enthusiastic about the session and proudly displayed the finished results, photo at right.



Introduction to Bonsai Training Course

Quentin Valentine Critique



BONSAI SENSATION NURSERY

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Insecticides, Fungicides and Miticides

Some members have requested information of systemic insecticides and where to buy them. The following is not intended to be a comprehensive review of the subject but hopefully is of some assistance.

First of all, what is a systemic pesticide? A systemic pesticide is any pesticide that is absorbed into a plant and distributed throughout its tissues, reaching the plant's stem, leaves, roots, and any fruits or flowers. Systemic pesticides are water-soluble, so they easily move throughout a plant as it absorbs water and transports it to its tissues. Systemic insecticides are commonly used to suppress herbivorous sucking or chewing insects like aphids including root aphids, caterpillars and the like. Systemic fungicides do the same to fungal infections.

This is in contrast to contact insecticides, fungicides and miticides which must actually contact the pest when sprayed onto the plant to have any effect. Pyrethrum is an example of a contact insecticide, but there are many other natural and chemical treatments.

Systemic insecticides have been removed from the shelves of Bunnings due to their propensity to also affect beneficial insects such as bees, which tend to lose their ability to

navigate back to the hive when collecting affected pollen from flowers. However, they are still available from various nurseries.

Systemic insecticides are generally based around the compound Imidacloprid, and this is what you should look for on the label when searching out a systemic insecticide.

The photos at right were taken at Mt Evelyn Garden Centre on York Road, Mt Evelyn, showing the stock that they carry. Other nurseries may also carry similar stock. Bug Killa is a granular form of Imidacloprid which is sprinkled on the soil surface and watered in, after which is it is taken up be the tree roots. Contendor is a premixed spray form and Conguard is a concentrate which you can mix into spray bottles, both of which are then applied by spray to the foliage for absorption.

Imidacloprid reputedly provides systemic action against chewing insects for up to 6 weeks from application.

Cautions:

- DO NOT USE when plants are flowering or expected to flower within 6 weeks of application.
- BEWARE when fruiting—fruits may be toxic to birds, animals and humans within 3 weeks of application.
- DO NOT ALLOW to enter drains, sewers or streams.

Fungicides are used to control fungal problems like molds, mildew and rust.

Some fungicides can work through the plants vascular system, but most seem to adhere to the plant surfaces instead. There are many types of fungicides both chemical and natural, but the one recommended by Scott Martin during his recent visit and also used by other club members is Mancozeb. Other types are listed as copper-based and phosphorous acid based. The phosphorous acid fungicide claims to be systemic, but the others do not. Yates Anti Rot and Yates Liquid Copper are two readily-available fungicides of the copper and phosphorous types.

All of the fungicides are available through Bunnings and most plant nurseries.

Mites on plants are very hard to spot as they are tiny, almost microscopic. Look for damage to the leaf surface in the form of pale spots or possibly tiny webs. Some claim that holding a white sheet of paper under the leaves and then tapping the leaves will dislodge a few mites, which may then be seen moving on the paper. Mites appear to be a different problem, in that most insecticides do not claim to kill them. One that does is Yates Mavrik, which also kills a range of insects through contact action. The fundicide Mancozeb Plus also contains a mitir

insects through contact action. The fungicide Mancozeb Plus also contains a miticide as well as the fungicide.

Sprayed lime sulphur is also a contact fungicide, insecticide and miticide.

Remember that all contact based treatments rely on the spray actually contacting the pest, so ensure that you spray the tops and underneath the foliage and trunk thoroughly. Repeat treatments are probably necessary to ensure that all life stages of the insect and mite are treated.

Always read and strictly follow the directions for each product which are printed on the labels.

Note that it is always better not to use any treatment unless you absolutely have to—there are many beneficial insects, mites and funguses that will also be killed. Think ladybugs, mycorrhiza, and predatory mites. Providing air flow through your trees and plenty of bench spacing will help your trees fight off any problems without your interference.

Also be vigilant and try to spot any potential problems early. Early treatment is easier than battling a heavy infestation.

Bonsai Calendar: March - April

The occasional glimpse of brilliant colours is the most rewarding sign that autumn is on its way. For many species, this can be the most exciting time in the growing season. Deciduous trees such as Maples, Hornbeams, and Elms can put on a dazzling display of yellows, oranges and reds as they would in nature.

Here are a few tips to help make the most of this time of the year.

- When the weather begins to show signs of coolness, progressively give your deciduous trees more sun. This will encourage autumn colour throughout the foliage. Watch out for the occasional hot days especially for Japanese maples!
- Some people also believe that reducing the amount of water given to deciduous trees may enhance autumn colours but don't go too far and stress the plant!
- Don't water the foliage on deciduous trees in the evening to avoid mildew! You can lightly mist azaleas.
- Turn your bonsais fortnightly if they get uneven light. This will ensure next years buds will develop evenly around the tree.
- Species such as azaleas, camellias and many fruit trees should not be pruned at this time if early spring flowers are desired. Azalea can still be pruned if shape/style is the priority - seal the cuts! New shoots should be reduced to two and the remaining shoots shortened to two sets of leaves.
- Late summer and early autumn growth will strengthen and increase the girth of trunks and branches. Inspect for wire damage, remove wire and rewire if needed for shape.
- Late summer provides a small window of opportunity to carefully repot some bonsai. Eg figs, most natives and some pines and junipers. Be very conservative with root pruning conifers at this time. Weather can be unpredictable, keep them in a sheltered position for a few weeks after the work.
- Use an organic fertilizer (liquid) high in potassium and phosphorus to encourage woody growth in the trunk
- Remove old fruit and flowers.
- Fertilize pines in autumn (not spring) to help reduce needle size and to prepare them for winter.

While enjoying your autumn display, put some thought into winter survival.

2025 AABC Convention

The Association of Australian Bonsai Clubs 2025 National Convention will be held in Canberra from 16th to 19th May 2025, hosted by the Canberra Bonsai Society. Featured international artists will be from USA - Jennifer Price from Chicago and Michael Hagedorn from Portland. In addition,



three Australian artists will be on the program as demonstrators—Jarryd Bailey from Tasmania, Sam Thompson from the NBP-CA in Canberra, and Marcela Ferreira from Melbourne. The venue will be the Canberra Rex Hotel and the National Arboretum.

Members are encouraged to consider attending the Convention to improve their bonsai knowledge, and as a side benefit to view the National Bonsai and Penjing Collection at the Arboretum.

Full registration fee is \$395. Note that places are limited due to venue size, so anybody wanting to attend is advised to book as soon as possible. As of January, there were only 40 remaining places available.
